26th Annual American Indigenous Tourism Conference

Choctaw, Mississippi - October 27-30

- The 27th American Indigenous Tourism Conference (AITC) explored the powerful intersection of cultural traditions and innovation in Indigenous tourism. Seminars and breakouts discussed creative ways to adapt, thrive, build new partnerships, embrace emerging technologies, and view challenges through a fresh lens.
- Carson City has a unique historic presence within the Indigenous Community. By collaborating and combining efforts with the Stewart Indian School, the Nevada State Museum, and other evolving assets, we can increase an authentic reach into the ever growing \$11.6 billion Indigenous hospitality sector.
- The AITC is the only national conference dedicated to growing tourism in America's Indigenous communities with over 300 attendees and 56 options for networking, high-level keynotes, sessions, and breakouts.



Mobile Workshop: History and Lands Tour

- We started at the mother mound, the birthplace of the Choctaw people, and learned the creation stories (migration/immersion) of the Chahta people and how it relates to Nanih Waiya.
- Then a tour of the Pearl River community tribal lands. Learning about the Mississippi Choctaw and what their ancestors had to do for them to be there today.
- We enjoyed a traditional Chahta meal for lunch, all cooked outside on an open fire.
- The afternoon was for creating a cultural item with Choctaw makers. We were able to choose from: rabbit stick keychain, sewn headband, beaded necklace and earrings, mini drum, round comb, or basket weaving.
